From the director: Building Something New

During this season of Thanksgiving, I want to express my gratitude to the Sisters and Associates of the Congregation of Divine Providence who have helped Providence

Spiritual Outreach (PROSO) ministry emerge from the nothingness of the pandemic shutdown.

God planted the seeds of PROSO in 2020 soon after I moved from Texas to work at an Ohio retreat center. It was a personally chaotic time. Covid hit six months later. I lost my job at the retreat center and became one among a wave of millions whose lives radically changed amid pandemic unemployment, isolation, grief, fear and loss.

What upended me, however, created a new opportunity for Providence. A wise Sister once noted, "Chaos is the workshop of Provi-

dence." Providence, the Masterful Rehab Artist, can step in and refashion something new out of the broken bits and pieces of life. That certainly has been the case with PROSO.

Telephone conversations and virtual programs at the retreat center attested to the depth of people's suffering of mind and spirit. There was a desperate need for new ways to express faith and maintain relationships. My homesickness, social isolation and loss of some of our Sisters to Covid

commingled with the brokenness of those around me.

God's love was the glue that held us togeth-

er. I deeply desired to be a true vowed Sister of Divine Providence: a woman of courage, eager to respond compassionately amid fear, think creatively, rally others in realistic ways, and head to the frontlines to minister to those most in need. I would have never dreamed that Providence would provide the virtual world as a way for us to do this!

The Congregation supported my vision of a virtual outreach ministry for adults tossed by the waves of pandemic, social, and personal change. The concept spread by word of mouth, and a team of CDP Sisters and Associates in Texas began to design and offer in-person

and virtual spiritual outreach program firmly anchored in trust in God's providential goodness, care and love.





At first, I thought that I had become distracted. I noticed that my prayer continued to mull over the information. This experience changed my heart. I felt something between anger and guilt. Anger that people could be so cruel, and guilt because I myself was very capable of falling into that same trap.

Racism or any prejudice can happen to anyone. When I realized this, I found my judgement had moved toward mercy. I was becoming more culturally humble and asked God to help me appreci-

ate the many ways Providence reveals God's self in peoples and cultures. I realized that I was "Blessed" as I became "Poor in spirit". I felt my heart transfigured more toward the heart of Christ.

We Groan With All Creation

Photo and reflection by Sr. Barbara Fry, Texas CDP Photography is a way to encounter reality in a very profound way. Focusing through the camera's lens focuses the soul beyond itself. Just as a painting or stained glass window can significantly move us, the process of taking photos leads us into a special rela-

tionship with the object in our viewfinder. When we encounter reality through the camera's lens or in an intense gaze, we unite with that reality.

My experience with photography has led me to be more aware of the beauty as well as the harsher realities around me. One of my favorite scripture passages is in Romans, "Yes, we know that all creation groans

and is in agony even until now. Not only that, but we ourselves, although we have the Spirit as first fruits, groan inwardly while we await the redemption of our bodies. But hope is not hope if its object is seen; how is it possible for one to hope for what one sees? And hoping for what we cannot see means awaiting it with patient endurance." (Romans 8:22-25)

I have planted seeds and documented their growth with photos. Yes, I hoped for what I could not see. I have photographed strong cacti in west Texas as well

as the results of Texas droughts; seeing the suffering of the people in the Madagascar deserts due to climate change greatly impacted me. Such scenes plant compassion in our hearts; we become even more aware of our world and see the world through God's eyes.



Since the beginning of the pandemic, we have all witnessed many kinds of suffering. However, while we wait with patient endurance, "The Spirit too helps in our weakness, for we do not know how to pray as we ought; but the Spirit makes intercession for us with groanings that cannot be expressed in speech." (Romans 8:26) Walking through nature, we can sense God's sus-

taining love for all creation. We realize we have all been loved into life. We who have been gifted to live in God's world can pray St. Francis' Canticle, "Most High, all powerful, good Lord, all praise is yours, all glory, all honor, and all blessings."

Why is the Ministry Named PROSO?

Names have power to define us. The PROSO team, focus groups, and Sr. Joyce wrestled for months with what to call the fledgling spiritual outreach ministry. Late one night she awakened to the word "PROSO." Unable to fall asleep, she groggily reached for her cell phone and entered the web search "What is PROSO?"

Chills began to run up her spine, as she read how God had sustained hungry birds and starving people for centuries with the ancient grain, Proso millet. Matthew 6:26, a favorite Scripture quote of the Sisters that speaks of God's loving providence, immediately came to mind. "Look at the birds. They do not plant, harvest or save food in barns, but your heavenly Father feeds them. Don't you know you are worth much more than they are?" Matthew 6:26

The acronym PROSO (PROvidence Spiritual Outreach) was an unexpected God-gift imbued with the same unfaltering message of hope and trust in God's provident, loving care shared by CDP's of Texas throughout the US and Mexico for over 150 years. PROSO Ministry does not feed starving people and hungry birds, but calls us to the essential task of finding creative and relevant ways to nourish the soul and respond to the modern spiritual hunger of our times.
