Grace Floods Our Doorsteps

This summer, I visited a place whose very name sparks the imagination, especially in June when the wild strawberries are just starting to appear in New England.

Strawbery Banke [using the local spelling], located in Portsmouth, NH, was the site of one of the earliest settlements of Europeans in what is now the United States. These settlers were, of course, not the first people to call this place home. As the Portsmouth library puts it, "The City of Portsmouth is on the homelands of the Abenaki people, who . . . have lived in the place now called New Hampshire for more than 12,000 years—since before Tribal memory. The Abenaki are part of a larger group of Indigenous people who called themselves Wabanaki or 'People of the Dawn' . . ." (www.cityofportsmouth.com/library/land-acknowledgement).

The Strawbery Banke Museum carries on the memories of many generations of people who chose to live just up the river from the Atlantic Ocean. Some of them were Christian and some were not. Some of them set down permanent roots, while others were only passing through, living more lightly on the land.

Strawbery Banke does not have "ocean views," nor is it subject to the wild waters of the Atlantic itself. Buffered by the Piscataqua River, the community originally had a "Puddle Dock," which flooded daily with the tides, bringing goods directly to the doorsteps of the businesses on the puddle-front and receding when the tides went out.

Today the "puddle" is flooded only for ice-skating in

the winter, but in the past this natural feature served the community and sometimes put it at risk. Too little water and the goods might have to be moved by hand; too much water and the tide is lapping at one's doorstep or beyond.

What is it about a harbor, or even a puddle, or a pond, that attracts generation after generation, people after people? Is it the proximity to wildness and beauty? The ever-changing scene, the expanse of openness? Perhaps it is the same force that draws small children to the running water of an immersion baptismal font. Water is ultimately an uncontrollable source, and yet it is also what gently sustains us.

Theologian Karl Rahner, in Foundations of Christian Faith, speaks of the "sea of infinite mystery." For Rahner, the ultimate Mystery is God, who draws us forth and fascinates us with wildness and beauty. It seems to me that when we encounter a harbor, or really any kind of "living water," we stand on the edge of the wilderness and wildness that is God. It may be that we are coming in from this wilderness, perhaps shaken or invigorated by what we have experienced, driven to our doorsteps by the tides of grace. It may be that we are setting out, ready to be swept away on the waves of a new journey led by the Spirit.

The harbor is the place of new beginnings. It is a place where traditions and communities hold together, a place that is familiar and yet never the same, a place from which we are drawn forth and welcomed home.

A Bonus Gift from Providence

My husband, Alberto, and I met in the Campus Ministry Office at Our Lady of the Lake University in San Antonio. We were married in Sacred Heart Chapel on the university campus in 2010. It took us eight years to conceive our first son, but we knew that it was important for us to trust God's providence. It would be his will and his perfect timing if he determined that we were ready for a family.

My dad was diagnosed in December 2018 with stage

four prostate cancer. Our first son, Albert, was born one week before my dad passed away. Grieving a parent passing from cancer but at the same time experiencing long-awaited motherhood felt like weathering a gigantic storm. I found peace in knowing that God is good and that my dad was free of pain. It is a blessing to know, because of our faith and God's unwavering grace, that there will be a time when we will meet again.

Our second son, Oliver, was born in 2021. We like to say that Albert was our first miracle, and Oliver was a bonus gift.

When I arrived at the hospital to deliver Oliver, we were surprised to learn that I had Covid. I felt totally fine; I didn't have a fever or cough or any other symptoms. This was in July

2021, a time when hospitals were still taking extreme precautions with women who had Covid and were about to give birth. I was quarantined in a special section of the hospital.

There was another complication, too. Oliver was not in position for delivery and could not be rotated. His heart rate began to drop at an alarming rate. The doctors ordered an emergency c-section. This sent me into a complete panic.

But my grandmother had a strong devotion to Mary and the rosary, so my natural instinct is always to pray the rosary in times of distress. As the staff prepared me for surgery, we requested prayers from our church family and used our Bluetooth speaker in our hospital room so we could hear each other praying. I held my rosary on the way to surgery.

It took a long time to deliver Oliver because I have stage four endometriosis and I lost a liter of blood during surgery. But the most precious little life made it out in great shape. He did test positive for Covid, but he came out crying and healthy!

Unfortunately, once I gave birth, my husband had to rush home to be with Albert, our older son. Albert has autism, so we were grateful that our extended family all lives close by. We were also blessed to have a babysitter who is a speech pathology major at Texas

> Christian University and works with him—and was available to stay with him while Alberto and I were at the hospital.


With Alberto at home, I was alone with staff, who were required to put on full personal protective equipment, even when bringing me water. So the typical nurse/patient engagement wasn't there, and neither was my husband. On the flip side, we were in constant contact through technology, and I just kept thinking how blessed we were to have such a problem—we were juggling not one but TWO boys!

God is a true Safe Harbor. He calms any storms we face in our lives, no matter the size. Knowing that he was wrapping our family in his arms and that those around us were praying


for our little family calmed our storm. Oliver was born a happy and healthy baby. While he was, in fact born with Covid, he did great, and we were able to return home with no issues.

The CDP Sisters and Associates have been a part of our lives since college, even before we were ever married or started thinking about a family. Their prayers and those of our church family are a huge part in our journey, surrounding us with God's love and comfort at some of our hardest times. God is Good. We know firsthand that trusting in His Divine Providence will always bring comfort in our times of need.
