What does 'mercy' look like?

This year's theme was "*The Name of God is Mercy*," by Pope Francis. The kynote speaker, Dr. Michael J. Laney, ACDP, inspired Associates and Sisters with his own personal life experiences and Pope Francis' words of wisdom.

Two questions resonated that day: "What does God's Mercy look like to you?" and "What do you need to obtain Mercy?".

What does Mercy mean? Merriam-Webster defines *mercy* as compassion or forbearance shown especially to an offender or to one subject to one's power. The **Chatechism of the Catholic Church** (CCC) 2447 reads that the Works of Mercy are *charitable actions by which we come to the aid of our neighbor in his spiritual and bodily necessities*. The differences between these two are that the CCC is based on truth, God's Truth. Everyone we encounter in intertwined in God's Truth.

How can we obtain mercy? Through the Corporal Works of Mercy is how you and I can obtain mercy. The Corporal Works of Mercy are a model for how we should treat all others, as if they were Christ in disguise (USCCB). Feed the Hungry: Try not to purchase more food than you are able to eat. If you notice that you end up throwing groceries away each week, purchasing less groceries would eliminate waste and allow you to donate the savings to those in need. Give Drink to the Thirsty: Organize a group of children involved in a sports team or a summer camp. Invite them to collect bottled water to distribute at a shelter for families. Shelter the Homeless: Many homeless shelters need warm blankets for their beds. If you can knit or sew, that would be an extra loving gift. Visit the Sick: Spend time volunteering at a nursing home. Get creative and make use of your talents (e.g. sing, read, paint, call Bingo, etc.). Visit the Prisoners: Volunteer to help out or donate to charities that give Christmas presents to chldren whose parents are in prison. Bury the Dead: Visit the cemetery and pray for those you have lost. Give Alms to the Poor: Skip the morning coffee/latte and put that money in the collection basket at church. (USCCB)

We were fed that Saturday and fed well, with personal experiences from the Associates and the Sisters as we listened and acknowledged what our Lord Jesus Christ had placed in front of us. The blueprint to answer the "what" and "how" of Mercy.

ACDP Formation -- One formation session remains: *The Commitment*, led by Ana Maria De La Portilla. We ask that you pray for the eight who will be completing their formation.


